### Step Two – Shop for Local Providers

The main rule: Don't let anyone pick up the body until you know the cost.

#### **Funeral Homes**

Home funerals conducted by family members are legal in Pennsylvania, but considerable advanced planning is usually required. In most instances you will need to arrange with a licensed funeral home to transport the body to the funeral home, prepare the body for disposition and transport the body to the cemetery or crematorium. You can find the names of local funeral homes in the Yellow Pages or on the internet.

Funeral homes are required by federal law to give you prices over the phone. We recommend that you call three or more funeral homes and get prices on these services at least:

You may also want pricing on viewings, memorial services, mileage, obituaries, death certificates, and other costs. If you have time, you may want to pick up complete General Price Lists from funeral homes.

#### Cemeteries.

Cemeteries are not required to give you prices over the phone but some will. Some also publish them on their websites. Ask for both cemetery lot prices, vault costs and interment fees.

### Step Three – Visit the chosen funeral home and cemetery to make the arrangements in person and pay.

What if you can't afford the services? Social Security (if deceased is entitled) will contribute \$255 and the Veterans Administration will provide a free plot to veterans. Call the VA if deceased was a veteran. NOTE: Funeral directors are all aware of the Social Security and VA benefits and will assist families in obtaining benefits. St. Vincent De Paul, 412-881-5560, is a source of help for individuals with no family. Allegheny coroner's office, 412-355-0990, has a list of rotating funeral directors who take indigent cases.

### Step Four – If you have time now, make this step one.

If you are reading this when you have more time for funeral planning, you can join the Funeral Consumers Alliance of Western Pennsylvania (FCAWP). We have already done some of the shopping for you on nearly thirty local funeral homes. Plus we offer many other services and funeral planning information. Our expenses of \$24,065 minus our income of \$16,399 resulted in deficit spending of \$7,666; this is equal to our change in assets for the reporting period.

Our one-time expenses of \$3,400 for work on establishing a web-site plus our donation of \$300 to the Salvation Army accounted for approximately 50% of our deficit spending. Our administrative and other expenses for a year are usually in the range of \$2,000.

Printing and postage costs for newsletters, membership renewal notices, meeting notices and ballot mailings accounted for 57% of our expenditures. Administrative and other costs accounted for 23% and meeting and luncheon costs accounted for 20%.

Annual membership dues and donations provided 99% of our income.

As is obvious, our ability to exist and function is totally dependent on the generosity of our duespaying membership. Our asset reserves do enable us to weather periods of deficit spending; however, our long-term viability will require us to maintain expenditures in line with income. With your ongoing participation and support, the Officers and Directors will continue to work to maintain your confidence in The ACRA organization.

# SAVINGEUNERAL COSTS.

At the September luncheon, our speaker Pete McQuillin, from the Funeral Consumers Alliance of Western Pennsylvania (FCAWP), spoke about how to reduce the costs of funerals. Many of these costs are due to lack of planning and forethought. His presentation included many useful references to help plan and be better educated. They are listed here for all to use:

### Affordable Funeral Planning Guide\*

Prepared by the Funeral Consumers Alliance of Western Pennsylvania\*\*

If you have been given this guide because a family member is nearing death or has died, and no funeral arrangements have yet been made or you want to change the arrangements, don't panic. You may feel pressured to make a quick funeral decision by the facility where your family member is located, but if you follow this step-by-step guide, you can guickly plan an affordable funeral that your loved one would have wanted and save a lot of money over making a less-informed choice. The steps outlined in this guide can usually be performed in about an hour or two.

### Step One – Choose a Disposition Method

Your options:

Conventional Cemetery Burial. This is typically the most expensive choice. According to the National Funeral Directors Association 2013 survey, the average US cost for cemetery burial in 2012 was \$8,343, which doesn't include cemetery fees for the lot and the interment. Those can bring the total to about \$10,000 to \$15,000. You can reduce this total by not embalming (saves \$695), not having a viewing (saves \$625), and not having a funeral home memorial service (saves \$645). In addition, the average cost for a metal coffin supplied by funeral homes was \$2,395. But, by law, funeral homes must allow families to supply their own coffins, which can be purchased online for a few hundred dollars. Most cemeteries require a burial vault, which averages \$1298, but if you call around, there are a few cemeteries that don't require vaults. If your family member is a veteran, you may be able to get a free cemetery lot and free interment at veterans' cemeteries such as the National Cemetery of the Alleghenies (http://www.cem.va.gov/cems/nchp/ncalleghenies.asp).

Woodland Burial. Sometimes called 'green' or 'natural' burial, woodland burial is in-ground burial without embalming, metal caskets, or vaults, Biodegradable coffins or cloth shrouds replace metal caskets, and grave markers are made of wood or native stones. Woodland burial is typically about one-third the cost of conventional cemetery burial, and it's better for the environment. You'll need to find both a green burial cemetery and a green certified funeral home. Listings for both are provided by the Green Burial Council on their website: greenburialcouncil.org. (Look under 'Finding a provider'.)

Cremation. This can be the least expensive disposition option. Complete direct cremation services are available online for about \$1000 or less. Some local funeral homes offer similar low pricing. However, other funeral homes charge as much as \$5000 for the same service, so it pays to call around. Cremation can be inexpensive if you find the lowest price offerings, but it is not particularly friendly to the environment. Cremation ovens use a lot of energy which make a big contribution to global warming. In addition, they pollute the air with mercury, nitrogen oxides and dioxins and other pollutants.

Whole Body Donation. There are a number of places that accept whole body donations. The cost is often low depending on how far the body must be transported, and the HGA reimburses up to \$100 of the costs. Contact the Humanity Gifts Registry (hgrpa.org 215-922-4440 M-F 8-3PM) for more information.

Organ Donation. This is not actually a body disposition option. After your family member's organs have been recovered, you will still need to choose conventional cemetery burial, woodland burial or cremation. For more information contact the Center for Organ Recovery and Education (CORE.org, mchristenson@core.org, 412-963-3563 - answers 24 hours).
