ENJOY EATING OUTDOORS SAFELY THIS SUMMER

With June, and the arrival of picnic and barbecue season, there are many opportunities to enjoy outdoor dining with family and friends. But the warm weather also brings with it the risk for foodborne bacteria to thrive and to cause foodborne illness. It is very important to keep in mind food safety guidelines when transporting and handling picnic food, and when preparing it and serving it safely. Following are a few tips for keeping your food safe from the refrigerator at home to the picnic table.

- Food safety begins with clean hands. Wash hands thoroughly before beginning food preparation. At the picnic site, if you don't have running water, consider using a water jug, paper towels and soap, or moist disposable towelettes.
- Make sure that all dishes and utensils are clean.
- Keep cold food cold. Place cold food in a cooler with ice or frozen gel packs.
- Organize cooler contents. Consider packing beverages in a separate cooler so that perishable foods won't be exposed to warm temperatures as picnickers open the cooler to replenish their drinks.
- Don't cross-contaminate. Keep raw meat, poultry and seafood separate from foods that will be eaten raw, such as fruits and vegetables.
- Rinse fresh fruits and vegetables under running water and dry them with a paper towel or a clean cloth towel before packing them in the cooler.
- When serving, it is important to never allow your picnic food to remain in the "Danger Zone" for bacterial growth which is between 40 degrees F and 140 degrees F for more than 2 hours, or for 1 hour if the outside temperature is above 90 degrees F. An easy reminder is once you have served the <u>cold perishable food</u>, it shouldn't sit out for longer than 2 hours, or if the outside temperature is 90 degrees or above, for one hour. If it does, **discard** it. Also, for <u>hot food</u>, it should not sit out for more than 2 hours, or if the outside temperature is 90 degrees or above, for 1 hour. If it does, **throw it away**.
- To keep insects off your picnic foods, you may wish to consider purchasing some pop-up mesh food covers.

Summer is a time to enjoy outdoor eating with family and friends. Being aware of and utilizing food safety measures when planning a picnic or other outside food gathering, is critical to minimizing the possibility of foodborne illness ruining these happy events.



UPDATE ON PETE TOWNSEND

You may recall back in the March 2020 issue of the ACRA newsletter we highlighted ACRA member Pete Townsend. At the time he was undergoing treatment for a condition known as Neurofibromatosis (NF), a progressive genetic disorder that causes tumors to form on nerve tissue. Pete always says NF means "no fun."

Pete has now had five electrodessication surgeries performed by Dr. Hubert Weinberg of the Manhattan Surgical Center, and we are happy to announce that they have been a success. Dr. Weinberg removed tumors from Pete's face and hands. At this time Pete is uncertain about returning to New



York for additional surgeries and may seek advice from a plastic surgeon in the Pittsburgh area.

Pete is extremely happy with the results of his surgeries. He says he feels more like a normal person now and people no longer stare at him. The surgeries and Dr. Weinberg have made a great deal of change to his life. Although Pete's NF has brought him challenges, it hasn't caused facial or bodily deformities, and his positiveness is a blessing.

Additionally, the A & E series titled "My Brave Face" which Pete is highlighted in episode five, aired in 2021 in England and on Netflix and IMDb. The documentary may return to Netflix in the future.

If your identity is comprised call the fraud department of the company where the fraud occurred. Ask them to close or freeze the account. Change logins, passwords, and PINs for your accounts. To place a free fraud alert, contact one of the three credit bureaus. That company must tell the other two. Fraud alerts last one year.

COUNTRY FAIR ORANGE CAKE

FOR CAKE

1 (15.25 ounce) package of yellow cake mix. I used Duncan Hines.

1 (3.4 ounce) package lemon instant pudding

3/4 cup orange juice freshly squeezed 1/2 cup vegetable oil

4 large eggs

3 tablespoons orange zest

PREHEAT OVEN. to 350 and flour a 10-inch Bundt pan.

Stir the cake and pudding mixes in a large bowl. Add the orange juice, oil, eggs, and orange zest. Beat on low speed with a mixer to combine. Scrape down the sides. Beat on medium for 4 minutes. Pour the batter into the prepared pan. Bake for 38-40 minutes @350 or until a wooden pick inserted into the center comes out clean.

Cool in the pan for 15 minutes on a wire rack. Remove from pan to wire rack. Cool thoroughly for 1 hour. Transfer to a platter. Drizzle warm orange glaze over the cake.

ORANGE GLAZE

1/2 cup of sugar 1/3 cup freshly squeezed orange juice 1/4 cup of butter 2 teaspoons orange zest

Cook sugar, orange juice and butter in a sauce pan over medium heat until the butter has melted. Cool for 2 minutes and stir in the orange zest.

Drizzle warm orange glaze over cake.
